rief: Autocratic and populist leaders in the EU, particularly in post-communist countries, have undermined constitutional democracy through the establishment of illiberal constitutionalism. This is characterised by the abuse of the rule of law, deterioration of democratic standards, and misuse of human rights. Some of constitutional courts in the region contribute to this process by issuing rulings that reflect and reinforce illiberal values, thus becoming instruments of illiberalism.

The investigation concentrates on identifying illiberal principles in constitutional court verdicts while scrutinising cases related to abortion, LGBTQAI+ rights, gender equality, and cultural identity. The objective of the study is to explore how societal value preferences affect political shifts towards illiberalism and how these preferences manifest in judicial
