Course / module objectives		<p>The aim of the classes in the Eastern Catholic Church Law is to present the historical context of the basic institutions of canon law at the example of law of the Latin and Eastern Catholic law. As a part of course, students learn e.g. comparison of some institutions of Polish law with their counterparts in canon law (in terms of the issue concordat), the basic institutions of canon law, sources of canon law. The purpose of course is to enable the students to perceive the relationship between institutions of law currently in force, and those existing before, so obtain skills, social skills and knowledge appropriate for a lawyer. The classes will give students the opportunity to more fully understand the essence of the modern institutions and law. The aim is also to develop the students' ability to work independently intellectual and: the regularity, reliability and certainty needed in the legal work.</p>

	Written test or essay on an agreed topic. Written test in form of answers to the questions concerning the content of the lectures problem. Duration of the test: 45 minutes. Each question is evaluated by one point. 10 points- correct answers to all the questions raised and the lack of factual errors. 9 points – one factual mistake. 8 points – two factual errors. 7 points – three factual errors. 6 points – four factual errors. 5 points – five factual errors. 0-4 – insufficient, 5 – sufficient, 6 -satisfactory plus, 7-8 - good, 9 – good plus, 10 – very good. On these principles takes place every test. Rules for calculating the grade from the subject Rating written test or essay is the evaluation of the subject in terms of the lecture.
